What is the first mitzvah the Jewish people observed upon entering the land of Israel?

(a) The mitzvah of walking in the Land of Israel
(b) The mitzvah of driving aggressively
(c) The mitzvah of waving some barley in the air

Technically, if you gave answer A, you're probably correct. Although perhaps the mitzvahs of believing in and loving God came first. If they were thinking about God as they entered the land and not, "Ooo, that part of the river bank is muddy, I better be careful not to step there." It's funny how we can sometimes miss the opportunities in the most profound moments because of something silly. But that's not what today's Dvar Torah is about, so please don't let me distract you. Now I'm making silly faces. I told you not to be distracted... why won't you listen? The Midrash actually

lists the

Korban Omer as the first mitzvah the Jews fulfilled when they entered Israel (they must not have worn tefillin on chol hamoed). The Omer was a barley offering that was gathered and waved about on the second day of Passover, thanking God for the produce that had grown. The Midrash continues by telling us that it was this Omer offering, brought upon entry to Israel that actually earned us the right to enter Israel. It is the reason, the Midrash explains, that Israel was promised to Abraham. It couldn't be the mitzvah of circumcision, because many Jews had already done that in Egypt. It also couldn't have been the mitzvah of celebrating Passover, because that, too, was done in Egypt. The Omer offering was never done before, and was a new Israel- based mitzvah. When I read this Midrash, it occurred to me how strange it sounded. If you had asked me, I'd have told you that we earned the right to Israel because of a mitzvah we had done. That's the way things work, isn't it? You do something good, you get a reward. If you do something right, you earn the

next posi-

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tive incentive. Right? Well, that's not how God works. It's not a game of action and reward.

God wanted us to earn Israel by what we were going to do WITH it, not by what we'd done beforehand. So the mitzvah they were GOING to do in Israel is a much better reason than mitzvahs we had already done. I'll illustrate this with some grammar. If you hate grammar, close your ears. Of course, since you're reading this with your eyes, closing your ears won't help much. Oh well. I tried to save you. One of the Hebrew words for 'why' is Lama (not the animal). If you break down the word, it is l'mah- for what- for what end purpose. A reason for something shouldn't be based on what happened in the past, but on what will happen, in the future, because of this. Living in the future is a much better investment than living in the past.

"But heu!" you might ask. "There are stories of angels with physical forms, like the ones who visited Abraham and Jacob! There are stories of angels defuing God's command! How does that fit with what you just said, Rabbi?" I told you this stuff is hard to understand! But seriously, good question, and we'll continue this conversation next week. Or not. We'll see how brave I'm feeling. For now, let's just leave with the understanding that 'angels' are spiritual forces with no bodies, whose sole existence is to function as God's agents. Bu the way, do you know how angels light a candle? With a match made in heaven.
