Shavuos is the holiday commemorating the giving of the Torah, right? So why doesn't the Torah say that! If I understand correctly, the Torah calls Shavuos the harvest festival, but doesn't mention Mount Sinai, the Torah or anything of the sort. What's up with that?

Dear C. Nye,

What two mountains were involved in the holiday of Shavuos?
Har Sinai and Har Vest.

In our prayers for Shavuos, we mention that it is the festival of the giving of the Torah. It's definitely a theme of the holiday. That said, we certainly shouldn't ignore that the Torah calls it chag hakatzir- the festival of the harvest. We should make sure to celebrate and thank God for the harvest, meaning our financial success. But the big question, one that has been addressed by many thinkers through the ages, including YOU, is this: If Mount Sinai and the Torah is a theme of Shavuos, and it IS a big deal, why doesn't the Torah mention EVEN ONCE any connec-

tion between the holiday and the Torah? Not once! There are a few ideas to help explain this mystery. The Torah, by purposely leaving out the most important part of Shavuos is sending us a message. One idea is the message that Torah has to be accepted personally. Making a large celebration

about the national acceptance of the Torah might distract us from the need to connect to Torah on a personal level.

Another idea (Maharal) is that Torah puts some intensely difficult obligations upon us. Don't get me wrong, the Torah is awesome! It guides us to a happier, more meaningful life, and helps us become better people. We certainly should celebrate having the Torah, yet God didn't want to obligate us to celebrate the Torah, because after all, he is obligating us to keep it, too! Celebrating it should be OUR choice. It's kind of like a surgery. If someone needs surgery which helps them have a healthier life, they should celebrate. But perhaps the doctor who did the cutting shouldn't be the one to throw the party.

One final idea (I don't mean that these are the only ideas- there are more, but these are the only ones I'm sharing today): A marathon is 26.2 miles. Yes, I know that's a weird length. Over a million people per year run marathons. It's a long race. Running 5 miles is also good for your health,

somewhat impressive, but obviously nowhere on

the scale of 26.2 miles. So you're at the Kalamazoo marathon (I don't know if Kalamazoo has a marathon, but it is a real place), and everyone starts running (not you... just everyone else). They run a mile, 2 miles, 3,4, 7 miles. They run 10, 15 miles. They're sooo tired. They run 20 miles. 21 miles. Then you join in and run the final 5.2 miles with them. Yes, it's cool that you ran 27,456 feet, or more impressively, 329,472 inches. Should you celebrate your accomplishment? Sure! Does it make sense for the town of Kalamazoo to make a sign commemorating your 5.2 mile run? Not so much.

We Jews accepted the Torah at Mount Sinai just about 3,335 years ago. But the truth is the Torah predates that by about, umm, infinity. The Torah predated the universe. Predated time. People long before Mount Sinai (like our forefathers) studied and followed Torah laws. Should we celebrate our relatively short, 3000ish year relationship with the Torah? Yes, of course! But for the Torah itself to mandate a celebration of Mount Sinai would be a little like celebrating the 5.2 mile runner. Nothing in comparison to the grandeur of the full product.

I suppose we're trying to make a molehill out of a mountain.
