"Ok everyone, we need a count."

The buses had just reached the museum's front gate for their annual field trip on prehistoric pickle fossils (what do you mean that's not a thing? It must be a thing). The whole school was there and the ticket office wanted an exact count of students before letting anyone in (you can't just let anyone in to see pickle fossils; they're in high demand).

"Alright students. Everyone hold up your textbook. Good. Now rip it in half. Yes, in half. Now hand in half your book. The museum will count whole books and double the number to know how many of you there are."

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Does that sound as silly to you as it sounds (to me?

No. not the part about fossilized pickles. Everyone knows pickles rock... I mean the

Maybe it's just a coincidental amount, but knowing the Torah and how careful and specific every detail is, there must be a reason. Why



Continued from page 1 It's no coincidence. The money given in the counting was used for communal projects. Counting the Jews shows us how important we are to God, and it is (I repeat myself, I know) NO coincidence that being generous, charitable and giving is THE WAY the Jewish people display our significance. The Torah is telling us that our kindness is one of the most telling

traits of why God continues to love and protect us.

Why half? This, too is a message for us. We should never think that we can live our lives separate from and ignorant of other people and their needs. Each person is only a partial person. Moses could not count a full shekel per person, because no person is complete alone. We need each other to become completed people. We thrive when we collaborate. We grow when we share. We don't just want to be great... we halve to be areat!

In fact the Hebrew word for prayer is 'tefilah'. The Hebrew root for that word is 'pilel' which means judgment. Prayer is a method of selfjudgment, when we get a better feel for what we actually want and why. By doing this we can do a better job of wanting the right things, and knowing if we really do.


