of Torah ever. Yet Moses was far from an eloquent orator. When God recruited Moses to lead the Jewish people out of Egypt, Moses tried as hard as he could to get out of it. One of his primary arguments was that a skilled negotiator would be needed to speak with Pharaoh, and he (Moses) was challenged in the area of speech. It isn't clear exactly what Moses's malady was- according to a Midrash, he had badly burned his tongue at a young age- it's certainly clear that public speaking was not his strength. Yet, he led and taught. Rabbi Samson Refael Hirsch points out that perhaps this very defect gave him more credibility. The world is filled with would-be leaders who have the gift of gab. When someone who is an awesome speaker convinces people to go along with them, there's always doubt: Have they really gotten people to buy into their vision, or are the people just wooed The

The same thing applies when Rabor mentors are extremely good ers. It's important for them to make sure they're delivering the proper information, and not just exciting words and hand tions.

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
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GALACTICALLY SYNDICATED COMIC STRIP

For thousands of years, we've been dividing the Torah into smaller bitesized portions, each called a 'Sidra' or 'Parsha' and reading a portion or two each Shabbos. Most of our Dvar Torah articles are based on the weekly Parsha, so we're thinking about including this as a weekly segment, giving bullet points of what happens in the Parsha of the week. PARSHAS SHEMOS 1ST PORTION OF THE SECOND OF THE TORAH'S 5 **BOOKS**

- Shemos means 'names' and so it begins with... you guess it... potatoes! No, you were right. It begins with the names of the sons of Jacob who came to Egypt. The next few weeks will describe what happens to the nation during our 210 year visit to the land of the pyramids.
- It actually doesn't call them the 'Sons of Jacob.' They're the "Sons of Israel." You may remember from way back in Vayishlach that Jacob's name was officially changed to Israel. This term, 'Sons of Israel' has become one of the primary names of our nation ever since.
- The names are: Reuben, Simon, Levi and Judah. Issachar, Zebulun and Benjamin. Dan, Naftali, Gad and Asher. Along with the rest of their family it's a total of 70 people, and Joseph was already in Egypt.
- Now the bad stuff starts.
- Egypt gets a new king (either literally a new king, or according to some, it was the same king but his PR department gave him a new image). This dude doesn't recognize the awesomeness Joseph had brought to the country and, nervous about Jews 'taking over the country' (wow, things don't really change much, do they?) decides to enslave them.
