Pass-Under-Standing


We love Passover! We love the seder! With all the excitement surrounding the various items at the seder, it's easy to forget the main purpose. We lean, dip, bite, crunch, sip, drip, roast, grind, hide, seek eat, sing, speak, laugh, and sometimes even fall asleep. Why do we spend all this time and effort? What's it all about? Of course, it's our way of remembering that during a really dark period in our history, we almost disappeared as a nation, and thanks to some pretty spectacular miracles (fire inside ice? wicked!), we were transformed into a free, independent nation of 'Hebrews' committed to G-d and following His instructions. Well, that was a pretty long sentence, excuse me while I take a sip of water (yes, even I drink water upon occasion).

Anyway, the main point of the haggadah is telling the story. Actually, the word haggadah means "telling". (Come to think of it, saying something like "telling the Haggadah story" is kind of like "using the ATM machine"...

Think about that one.)

Something doesn't fit. In the process of talking about the great things that happened way back then, the Haggadah takes a little break to praise G-d for talking about four different kind of kids. One is wise, one is wicked, then comes a simple son and one that is unable to ask. Why are they randomly mentioned here, and why do we praise G-d for it?

The Torah is unbelievably cool. It can be understood by a pre-schooler on a simple level, and can also be studied by the most brilliant minds. When it comes to the Haggadah, this is especially important. The Passover seder is the




DVAR TORAH

Handy Dandy Guide



I was very impressed recently when we got a new board game (we do that pretty often). All games come with instructions, but this game had a separate pamphlet explaining how to get the most enjoyment out of the game by using certain strategies. I appreciated that. It's the same with books. Some books are like, "here's some information that might interest you." Other books are more like,

"Here's a practical and handy guide on how to best use the information in this book to build a rocket ship at home."

I'm always amazed at how the Passover Haggadah does this so well. Offhand, I'll mention a few places it does this.

1. The 4 sons. Near the beginning of the section telling the story of the Exodus, the Haggadah pauses to talk about 4 different kind of kids and how to teach them about Passover.

This is not an accident. This is "A guide to using the Haggadah's information for the best results".

2. After mentioning the ten plagues (which for kids is one of funnest parts of the haggadah-dipping fingers into our drinks, yeah!), we abbreviate the ten into a three part phrase: D'Tzach, Adash B'achav. Why? I know there are many deep explanations of why we abbreviate and why this type of mnemonic. Yet there's a simpler explanation. Mnemonic devices are meant to make it easier for us to learn and remember. Yet another example of the collaborative authorship of the haggadah doing more than just telling the story, but giving us instructions on how to get the best experience from it.

3. Random, seemingly unrelated pop-up actions. Sometimes when I'm giving a presentation to a group of students and it's going long, I'll suddenly ask everyone to stand up and lead them through a series of stretches. With one family, we use a multi-sided rubber die with names of exercises on it. Once or twice per lesson we roll the die, stop learning and do the exercise (my knees do not appreciate the burpees). Many times during the haggadah, we pause our normal telling to do something unusual (cover the matzah, uncover the matzah, remove seder plate, dip veggies in salt water, search for broken matzah), at least partially just to break the monotony and keep the children interested. This is brilliant, and is yet another example of the haggadah providing a full-service immersive learning experience.

4. Then of course there are the actions we do, like leaning, spilling the drops of wine, and so many more symbolic actions that act as visual and sensory aids to help us truly feel the reality of the Passover story.
