This is perhaps one reason for this whole Parsha.


QUICK FIX!






Dear Wall, Do,

What a profound question! You've touched upon a challenge that humans have faced since forever. Indeed it can be frustrating to try and connect with someone or something that does not seem to return your efforts. Imagine trying to have a conversation with someone who then ignores you. Like, if you've ever tried to have a conversation with a teenager who owns a phone, you'll know what I'm talking about. At best it's like you're talking to an NPC. So here are a couple of strategies that you can use to help relate:

A small child and his father are shipwrecked in a plane crash on an abandoned desert tropical jungle island planet (I think I've covered every possible scenario). As they're climbing over a river- mountain- cliffvolcano, the son falls and sprains his ankle. If that wasn't bad enough, they hear snarls coming through the foliage. Autocorrect wants me to say they hear snails coming through the foliage. I imagine that would not be nearly as terrifying as snarls, unless they were really, really big snails. So hey, why not. They hear the snarls of giant, man- eating underwater desert snails. They try to run, but the son's ankle just isn't up to it. His father lifts him onto his shoulders and begins running in a mad dash through the trees, pyramids and orange construction cones, keeping his



distance from the not-so-sluggish snails. The son, petrified, calls out to his father. "Dad! Will we be OK?" His father (either because he's preoccupied, or because he doesn't know English) doesn't answer him.

Whenever we are protected from harm, when Israel survives yet another attack, or when someone recovers from an illness; these are God's arm around our shoulders. It might be challenging- no, it IS challenging to think about this all the time. Yet spending just a minute each day thinking about the amazing blessings we have in life, can be a powerful tool to build this realization and help encourage us to feel warmly toward our Creator. In particular, there are two things I recommend. The prayer "Modeh Ani" is super short and is said right when we wake up. It's a quick thank you to God for giving us a new day of life. The second thing is blessings over food. We eat often. I eat really, really often. If we train ourselves to thank God each time we eat, we'll have a much easier time feeling His hugs.


