



Dear Tom,

is when the teacher is absent. The jou is palpable. A full 40 minutes to do as you please. When I was in high school, anytime there was a free period, there was a mad rush toward the basketball courts. It would have been unfortunate had any person or small mammal been in that staircase when the thundering hooves pounded their way toward the schoolyard. Remember Mufasa? Thought so. Except one time. Our English teacher was away and someone decided we needed to actually learn this time, so they showed us the most incredibly boring video ever created. In it, several actors were taking turns reading lines of Shakespeare, changing their tone and inflection. "In sooth, I know not why I am so sad." "In SOOTH, I know NOT why I am so sad." "In sooth, I KNOW not why I am so sad." "In sooth, I know not why I am so SAD?" "In sooth, I know not why-I-am-so sad." And on it went, for about 40 minutes. I did learn that even with the same exact words, there can be huge differences in meaning depending on the tone, body language,

the same words, and you can get a totally different impression.

The Torah is our most important document. It contains vital words of wisdom, life lessons and the rules we need to live our best lives. Yet the Torah is difficult to understand. It's made more difficult because Torah scrolls don't have punctuation, vowels or ice cream shops (don't roll your eyes at me, it's true!). The tunes of the Torah trop actually do help us group words properly and give hints to help us properly decode the information the Torah contains.

These tunes are so essential to understanding and reading the Torah properly, that according to one opinion in the Talmud (Nedarim 37b), they are required by Torah law! Some sources have the tunes and the symbols date back as early as Moses. The Talmud mentions King Solomon using 'te'amim' which is the Hebrew word for trop.

On a simpler level, using a tune helps you remember stuff. Think about school... You might not be able to remember the names of all 44 countries in Europe, or what year the War of 1812 happened in, but you probably know dozens of songs by heart, lyrics and all. You even know what parts to start playing air guitar. Because tunes are great memory aids. Many a Bar Mitzvah student has

As far as Jewish law is concerned, don't worry about messing up the trop. People might throw things at you, but hey, it's your bar mitzvah, and they're gonna throw things anyway. The only parts of Torah reading that are serious problem to make a mistake on is mispronouncing words in a way that changes the meaning. So do your best to learn the trop because, as we've mentioned, the tune will help you remember it, and because it helps the understanding of the Torah's meaning. But don't stress it too much. That will lead to entropy.

- We are introduced to Abram, the son of Terach




This week on Instagram, we asked people to vote on which Jewish matriarch they'd most like to meet. At the time of publishing, here are the results:
