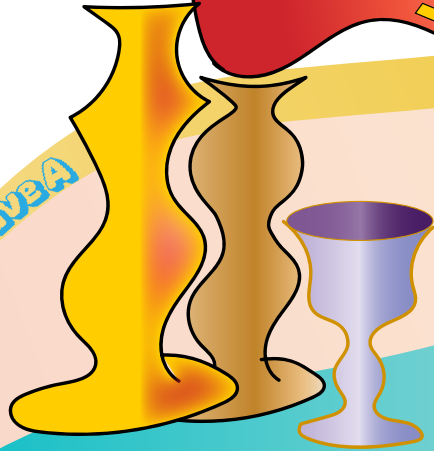

Hello. God? Sorry to keep You waiting. What is it you wanted to tell me? Hmm. Moses is going to die tomorrow? Oh. I see.

I'll tell you what. Tomorrow doesn't really work for me. No, No. next week isn't good either. You see, after all Moses has done for our people,

we just can't let him go. What do you mean he's going to enter a cave and die there? We won't let him! No caves! We're going to start a Go

And never, ever, put God on hold.

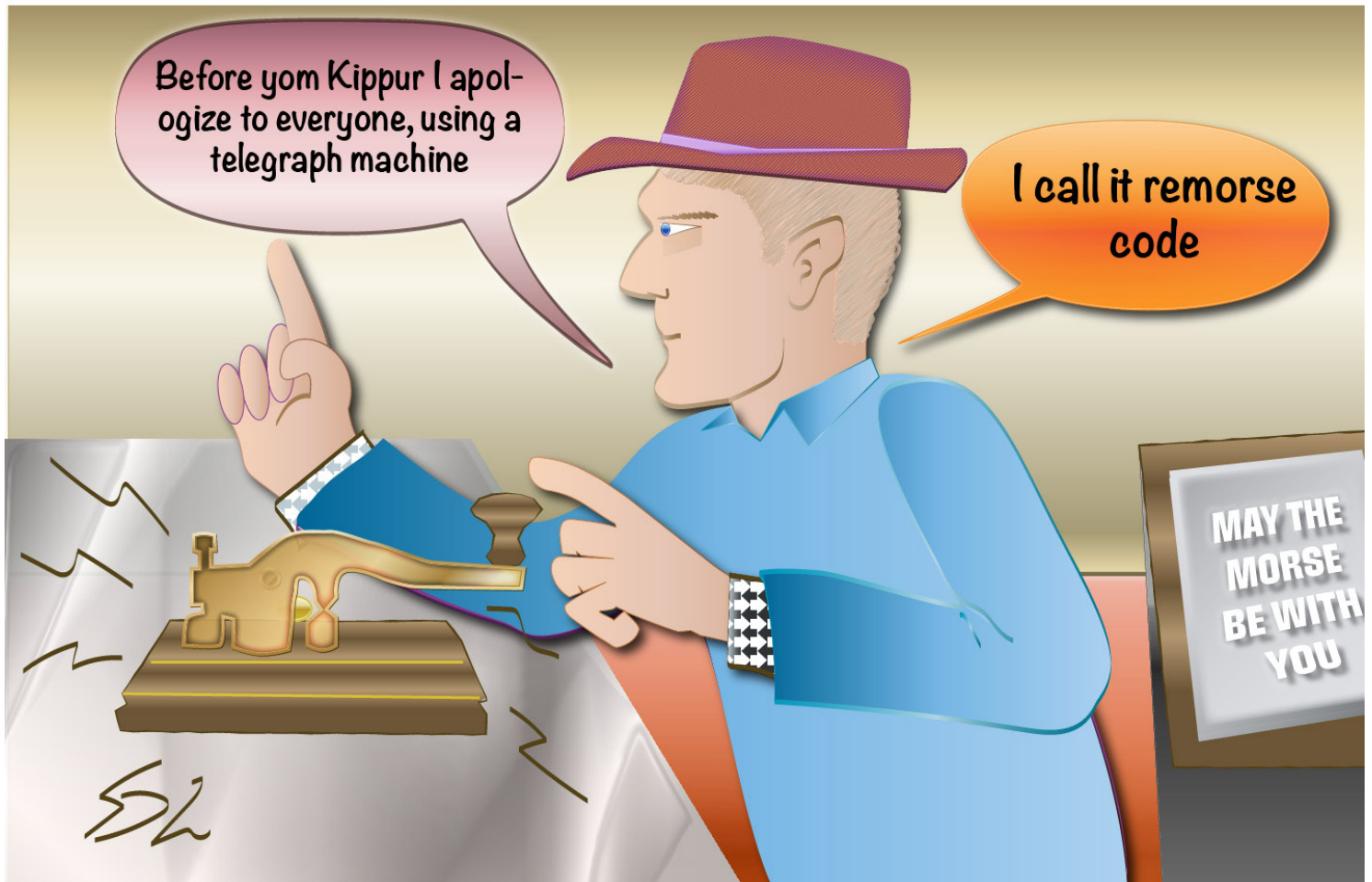

### Repair Toolkit (Teshuva continued)

Wouldn't it be nice if we had a CTRL+Z for the things we do in real life? Fortunately it doesn't work that way. Yes, I said fortunately. The world would be a terrible place if our actions had no consequences. Yet, as we learned last week, there is often a way out, and we should take it. Here are a few important rules and conditions about how teshuva works. We'll do it in a question and answer format, 'cuz after all, this is stump the rabbi.



#### IS THERE EVER A TIME THAT TESHUVA DOESN'T WORK?

"If one says, I will sin and do teshuva, that person is not granted enough ability to do teshuva." Imagine you're a very forgiving person, and someone takes advantage of that, specifically harming you because they know you're going to forgive them. That would be a good reason not to forgive them. If a person relies on teshuva, like, "I'm just gonna live my life exactly how I want and then pray a lot on Yom Kippur and it'll all be good!" God makes it difficult for that person to achieve teshuva (not impossible, but hard). It's also just a bad idea. It's like buying things on your credit card; they tend to stack up until they're too big to pay off easily. If you don't succeed, the interest compounds and then you end up with an entire pickle factory that you can't cover the mortgage and... sorry, don't let my trauma affect you.

#### WHAT IF YOU ONLY PLAN TO DO TESHUVA BECAUSE OF DIFFICULTY OR ILLNESS?

Many people live their lives without much thought, but then when faced with problems, suddenly turn to God. If I was God, [we would all have

unlimited pickles, and also] I would totally not accept that teshuva. Guess what? We're all lucky that I'm not God. For several reasons, I imagine. Regarding this topic it's that God promises to accept sincere teshuva EVEN when the teshuva is motivated by ulterior motives. One of the great sages of the talmud, Reish Lakish, started his career as a famous bandit. He only began his journey toward change in order to marry a beautiful woman. Yet he became one of the talmud's most respected scholars. So yes, if a person's motivation is for the wrong reasons, teshuva still works as long as it contains admission, regret and changing your ways.

#### WHAT HAPPENS IF I HURT ANOTHER PERSON. DOES TESHUVA WORK THEN?

Wouldn't that be convenient. Just like this exchange:

"Mr. Smith, did you, on the night of the 21st, rob the bank of 184 million dollars? Remember you are under oath."

"Yes, your honor. I robbed the bank. I've admitted it, I regret it, and I won't do it again.

no jail time. Right?"

If a person harms another person, they **MUST** make it up to the person, in addition to doing teshuva. That means if there was a financial loss, it must be paid back, and if a person was embarrassed, shamed, disgraced, disparaged, insulted, or anything else of a personal nature, they must be asked personally for forgiveness. Sometimes, if a person was injured (or worse) or if their reputation was ruined, there's really no way to make it up to them, and therefore no way to get complete teshuva. Once you open the gates on the dam, there's no getting the water back inside. There are, however, ways to work toward making amends. One example that comes to mind is the tyrannical King Herod. To make a long story short, Herod killed a lot of people including all the Rabbis he thought would oppose his monarchy (he wasn't even technically Jewish, so not eligible to be the Jewish King). He eventually wanted to repent. He was told, "You dimmed the light of the world, you must therefore increase the light of the world." He rebuilt the Holy Temple in a magnificent and grand way. That may not have been a complete teshuva toward his many horrific deeds, but partial credit is important. Which brings us to our last question for today:

### ARE THERE LEVELS IN TESHUVA?

Didn't I just say there are? It is very difficult to do a complete teshuva. For example, you may have made a mistake because you had an unusual opportunity, or a sudden extremely strong impulse to make the wrong choice. The only way teshuva is 100% complete is to stand up to the same exact level of temptation (no, you should **NOT** try to recreate the temptation). That's often impossible. Nevertheless, we

do the best teshuva we can do, and God works with us.

In summary: Fixing mistakes is complicated, and sometimes can take a lifetime. The keys to remember are that if we admit our mistakes, regret them, plan not to do them again and fix any harm caused to other people, we will certainly be well on our way to changing for the better. The talmud tells us that even a pure person who has never made a mistake can not measure up to the greatness of someone who changed and repaired themselves and their relationship with God.
