DVAR TORAH

"If you follow all my rules, then your reward is... that you followed all my rules!" That sounds like an odd

reward. I tried this with my kids and it got mixed reviews. I'm kidding, they were not mixed at all. Kids don't think that is funny. At. All.

The beginning of this week's Torah portion has very interesting wording. "See, I have put before you... a blessing and a curse... the blessing, that you will listen... If you pay attention to the words, you might notice that it doesn't say "You get the blessing IF you listen." It says the blessing is THAT you listen. We know that the Torah is extremely precise in the way it speaks, so if it says something in an unusual way, that

means something. A number of commentators point this out, and they explain that the Torah is indeed being very clear and specific.

There are people in the world who try to live without rules and without discipline. As a rule (pun intended), their lives lives are chaotic, unhappy and filled with drama and trauma. One of the greatest gifts we can give our children, and ourselves, is a structured system of values and social cues. People who follow a path, rules to live by, aren't only better people than they could have been otherwise. They are happier people.

So God tells us that if we follow His rules, the greatest blessing is THAT we follow His rules. Sure, there are other side benefits (as the Torah

goes on to describe), but the main prize is the path itself. There may be times in life when you think to yourself, "I wish I could do whatever I want!" What kid hasn't dreamed of that? Yet in reality, we would not be better off that way. Rules rule!








Dear Percy,

Let's split this question into two parts. Today we will focus on the national question. If we're God's people, shouldn't we get special treatment?

This week's Torah portion provides the answer to this question. The portion begins by describing the 'blessings and the curses:' the awesome benefits and blessings the Jewish people are entitled to when we are acting as we should, and the troubles we go through when we are not.

One of the greatest sports movies, in my opinion, is Miracle, the story of the 1980 US Olympic hockey team and their unlikely victory over the unbeatable Soviet team. One memorable scene takes place after a terrible loss, and the coach, Herb Brooks, makes the team go through incredibly painful and exhausting skating drills. Over and over they skate line to line, until they're dropping from exhaustion. The whistle blows over and over and the players

are suffering. Until one player answers the question, "Who do you play for?" He barely gets out the words, "I play for the United States of America!" This is a turning point in their quest for Olympic gold, realizing (in the words of the coach) that the name on the front of the jersey is more important than the name on the back.

The Torah outlines our national mission.

Then it tells us about the intense measures our Coach will take, to ensure that we remember that our national identity is more important than our individual egos. The Talmud tells us that the temple's destruction and our lonnnnng exile are because the Jewish people don't get along. Look around the world today. Does it seem like we 'play as a team?'

It is only because God loves us and believes in us that He sometimes deals with us in a forceful way. We are the team with Olympic hopes. We are the nation with the potential of Abraham and
